

MARY KITAGAWA, OBC, is a prominent leader in the effort to raise awareness of the injustices suffered by Japanese-Canadians during World War Two. Overcoming indifference and discrimination, she has helped to ensure that this history is recognized and taught to future generations. Her persistent efforts over three years persuaded UBC in 2012 to present honorary degrees to the 76 Japanese-Canadian students who were interned in 1942 and prevented from completing their degrees.



Her legacy also includes educational programs at UBC, UVic, and in the community, preservation of Hastings Park as a historic site, and renaming of the federal Douglas Jung building downtown. She has also served in many committees including the JCCA and Landscapes of Injustice.

Raoul Wallenberg Day pays tribute to the courageous actions by people engaged in selfless acts of civil courage in the spirit of Raoul Wallenberg and Chiune Sugihara, who each rescued thousands of Jews during World War II.

The Wallenberg-Sugihara Civil Courage Society presents the Civil Courage Award to an individual associated with BC who at great personal risk has acted courageously to help others. Peg, a wife and mother struggling to keep the wolf from the door, and Aya, a young middle class Japanese Canadian woman from Vancouver, grapple with their situation, as a frontier town becomes a Japanese community overnight.
